8th place RPV came to Honeycroft having won 3 in a row all 3-0 but made a slow start against Uxbridge who made 2 changes from the defeat at Moneyfields with Josh Addae and Fabio Sole replacing Luke Paris and Leo Decabo who both dropped to the bench.

Uxbridge started brightly and in the first minute Sole had a half volley on the edge of the area blocked bravely by a defender. 2 minutes later Hippolyte was played through and had a one on one with the RPV keeper who pushed him wide and his cut back was half cleared off the line to Josh Addae to finish with aplomb! A further 9 minutes passed with not a lot happening until RPV ventured into the Uxbridge area for the first time all game and the ball found Daniel Berry in space and his scuffed shot found the corner of the net. This gave RPV confidence and in the 19th minute, a cross-field ball in the box was called by George Legg who didn't punch the ball but instead got the RPV striker and a yellow card for his troubles. The subsequent penalty was tucked away by Dan Moody who sent Legg the wrong way. With the game petering out for half time, Jonathan Hippolyte turned and shot on the edge of the area and forced a good save from the RPV keeper - his first of the game.

fed through to the striker but Legg atoned for his error to make a match saving save! Uxbridge captain CJ Fearn made a good block from George Vincent in the area in the 60th minute and 3 minutes later nearly scored at the other end when he was inches wide from a corner. However, CJ was just getting his bearings.......Paris, Witham, Wilson, Decabo replaced Ada, Harry Rush, Sole and Casey between the 72nd & 83rd minute. With the referee, Nick Reece signalling a minimum of 5 minutes additional time Paris was now playing as a forward creating havoc. 4 minutes into the said 5 minutes James Dickson decided to stop an attack on the half way line and in doing so earned himself a second yellow card. 96 minutes had passed but the Red Army still believed and George Legg came up for an out-swinging corner by Leo Decabo which was cleared to Wilson and his fantastic header 25 yards from goal was played into the danger area and CJ Fearn picked himself up off the floor to find himself in space to rifle in the roof of the net for an equaliser. Surely that was it, but no, there was enough time for RPV to break and they would have snatched an undeserved win bar a fantastic block by Kai Hobbs.

Saturday 25thJanuary Hartley Wintney 5-1 Uxbridge

Reds dry run continues

Uxbridge's own version of dry January came to an end with a chastening defeat at fellow play-off hopefuls Hartley Wintney on Saturday, this being their fourth match without a win since the victory over Kingstonian at the end of December. 'The Row' were fully deserving of the win, and with an aggregate score of 9-1 in favour of the Hampshire side this season, The Reds will be glad to see the back of both the month and their opponent.

The game started slowly with neither side creating too many openings, Jonathan Hippolyte had a half chance on 7 minutes but his low shot was straight at home keeper Nick Jupp. One minute later came a good chance for the home side, but Seb Karczewski's free header went well over the bar. The half wore on and the hardworking Hartley Wintney side began to exert themselves on the match, taking the lead on 26 minutes. A cross from the right by Ellis Osborn was not dealt with by the Uxbridge defence, and Calvin Camara was on hand to tuck the ball away. On 32 minutes an Uxbridge free-kick appeared to strike the hand of a defender in the box, however the officials waved away the protests, this decision was to haunt The Reds, as a few minutes later the home side were awarded a spot kick of their own, when CJ Fearn was adjudged to have impeded the attacker - there were no appeals from the home side, and the decision seemed to baffle all of the 347 in attendance. George Winser made no mistake from the spot, to leave Uxbridge facing a mountain to climb.

Any hopes of a comeback were quickly extinguished early in the second half, on 55 minutes the ball was lost in Midfield and was picked up by Charlie Pastance who advanced to the edge of the box and then curled a fine shot into the far corner leaving George Legg with no chance. Barely two minutes later it was four, as a poor backpass was seized upon by Camara and he rounded Legg to square to Winser who duly despatched the ball into an empty net. It should have been five on the hour but a combination of last ditch defending a great block from Legg, kept the score to just four. With the game won The Row sat back on their lead and Uxbridge did finally start to create some chances. Josh Addae put in a fine cross on 69 minutes, which defender Ross Stepney skewed the clearance onto his own post, and then saw the ball cleared. One minute later substitute Andrio Brandao thought he had scored from close range but was adjudged to be offside. Soon after Hippolyte broke clear, but keeper Jupp was able to get out quickly and smother the chance as the striker tried to go round him. The home side continued to terrorise The Reds defence though and only a superb save from Legg from Postance's header on 72 minutes kept the score down. It was five however on 80 minutes when Hartley Wintney earned a second - less contentious - penalty for a foul in the box. Winser stepped up confidently to dispatch the kick for his hat-trick. There was time for a first goal in Uxbridge colours for Hippolyte in stoppage time, as a ball over the top caused some hesitation in the home side's defence and the former Hayes & Yeading man nipped in between the 2 defenders for something of a consolation goal.

All in the ground were then treated to an incredible sunset, which we all hope is not a metaphor for Uxbridge's play-off hopes - and the visit of in-form Moneyfields to Honeycroft next week will be a big test indeed.

WALKING out onto the hallowed turf at Wembley is every young football fan's childhood dream. Dave Jones remembers it better than most. When Atherton Laburnum Rovers chairman Shaun Lynch appointed a new manager 18 months ago, there were raised eyebrows among some observers given his chosen one was only 23 at the time.

"Sometimes you have to give a lad a chance," he said. And it's fair to say he has no regrets.

This afternoon, Jones will lead out his side at home to Bourne Town in the FA Vase last 16 in a game billed as LR's biggest knockout game since they reached the competition's semi-finals stage in 1994 – before Jones wasn't even born.

His side, the only Step 6 club still standing, hailing from North West Counties League's First Division North, have eliminated four teams from a higher level to get this far – including a thrilling 3-2 success against Hallam in the previous round secured by Ryan Talbot's last-gasp penalty.

"That moment is a perfect example of what this young group is about," he told The NLP this week. "They're fearless, and they back each other. When they needed to show character, they did."

The same could be said for a club that has rallied from the brink of financial ruin five years ago when they were reprieved from relegation to a regional feeder league. Jones, still just 25, has had a galvanising impact since taking charge and steered LR to second spot in the table last season. They missed out on promotion through the play-offs and occupied the same position entering this weekend – four points behind Nelson with four games in hand.

"When I came in, I wanted to reconnect the team with the town and give it an identity," said Jones, who prepares the pitch for National League high-fliers Altrincham as the Robins' head groundsman in his day job.

"You can feel the positive energy around the club as a result of this cup run, and those supporters who have been here through those tough times are really savouring the moment."

He plans to relay a similar message to his players before kick-off against a Bourne Town side currently leading the way in the United Counties League Premier Division North and involved at this stage for the first time ever in their 45th Vase campaign. The LR boss added: "We didn't expect to do this well in the FA Vase, which is why it's important to enjoy the experience.

"Most lads in our dressing room won't probably get this far again, and I want us all to look back in 10 years' time and be able to say; 'they were good times, weren't they?"

But Atherton LR and Bourne are not the only clubs looking to make history in this year's FA Vase.

Half of the 16 clubs still standing are appearing in the fifth round for the first ever time – and there's also still a former winner looking to return to Wembley ten years after their last visit. Northern League side North Shields host Whitchurch Alport for whom victory would match their best run to the quarter-finals from three years ago. All 50 previous FA Vase finals have included a first-time finalist – and this year looks to be no different.

Another former quarter-finalist is Crook Town, looking to repeat the feat from 19 years ago with a victory at Heanor Town – one of the eight clubs appearing in the fifth round for the first time.

VCD Athletic are in the fifth round for the first time in 18 years and they host Hellenic League leaders Hartpury University, while Whitstable Town have had a 28-year wait for the chance to reach the quarter-finals for the first time. They entertain a Fleet Town side who had never been beyond the second round before this season.

Egham Town travel to AFC Whyteleafe with the winner being a quarter-finalist for the very first time, while Erith & Belvedere are looking to match their best run to the quarter-finals from 10 years ago with victory over Daventry Town.

The Deres have won through six rounds already, via four penalty shoot-outs, having scored just four goals in normal time.

Conversely, Andover New Street, reinstated last week at the expense of Roman Glass St George, and their fellow Wessex League visitors, AFC Stoneham, have scored 28 goals between them in this season's Vase so far.

In the Trophy, all eyes are on Step 4 flag-flyers Sittingbourne, appearing at this stage of the competition for the first time in the club's 50th Trophy campaign – a competition record for the most campaigns before reaching the last 16.

The Step 4 Brickies travel to National League side Southend United in one of two ties that will see the winner setting their best Trophy run.

Worthing are into the last 16 for the first time in 39 years, and take on National League Rochdale, while Oxford City, of National League North, last went beyond the Last 16 four years ago. They take on twice beaten finalists National League side Forest Green Rovers.

A former multiple winner is Woking, who travel to the only Step 3 club still involved this season, Gainsborough Trinity, semi-finalists in 2013, while Spennymoor Town host Boston United 32 years after the Lincolnshire club knocked Spennymoor United out of the Trophy.

National League North side Kidderminster Harriers lifted the Trophy 38 years ago and they host Sutton United of the National League, while two-time winners Altrincham face league rivals Eastleigh, who last reached the quarter-finals 11 years ago.

The final tie of the round sees two former semi-finalists face each other as National League Aldershot Town host Boreham Wood, from National League South, although it's 17 years or more since either side reached the last four.

Leo Decabo (Midfield)

Leo joined The Reds in September 2024 from Hartley Wintney and made an instant impact with two goals on his debut against Pheonix Sports in the FA Trophy. Scored an impressive 22 goals for Burnham last season.

Reece Robins (Midfield)

Attacking midfielder who began his career at Walton Casuals. Part of the successful Leighton Town side, played at Badshot Lea and Chertsey Town last season.

Lewis Cole (Midfield)

Returned to Honeycroft last season from Harrow Borough and had a great season which saw him crowned player of the year. Combative midfielder who made his Reds debut in 2014 aged nineteen.

George Moore (Midfield)

Attacking midfielder who joined us from Harrow Borough in 2023. Last season's top scorer, which saw him voted Supporters Player of the year. Was regularly amongst the goals at Step 3.

Andrio Brandao (Midfield)

Skilful, attacking midfielder who joined from Virginia Water last season. Made a big impression during the latter part of the campaign and everyone at the club is excited to watch his progress this season.

Wilson Chingoka (Midfielder)

All action midfielder who joined the club in January 2024. Big personality who has experience at Step 3. Previous clubs include Nuneaton Borough, Potters Bar Town, Lewes, Bedford Town, Staines Town and Northwood.

Leo Donnellan (Midfielder)

Former QPR youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

Glenn Yala (Defender/Midfield)

Played at Chalfont St Peter for Manager Danny Edwards. Vastly experienced player whose versatility makes him a managers dream. Former North Greenford United, Waltham Abbey, Aylesbury, Hanwell Town and Chertsey Town player.

Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

Ada Okorogheye (Forward)

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

.Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. Alocal solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under thisname in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" wasborn. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to reestablish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A reorganisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994,1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Chairty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

Moneyfields FC - Club History

The Club began its current guise back in 1987. Having reached the upper age group of the Portsmouth Junior Leagues, a group of players decided to continue playing as a collective by joining Portsmouth Civil Service and in turn forming their Reserve side.

Gradually most of the players moved up to the First Team, by 1991 the side had risen from the Portsmouth League into the Hampshire League Division One, coming off the back of three successive promotions. The Club's League success was also matched in Cup competitions with Portsmouth Senior Cup wins in 1991 and 1992, followed by Hampshire Intermediate Cup victories in 1992 and 1993.

After several seasons in the upper reaches of the Hampshire League, it became apparent that the Club would have to move away from their home in Copnor Road if they were to progress. After scouring the city, the Club agreed a lease on the old Moneyfields Sports Ground in Copnor. In 1994 the Club moved to its current ground and became part of the Club whose name we now carry.

The Division One years were particularly successful and under the management of George Wain and Micky Gee, Moneys never finished lower than 6th and clinched the 1996-97 League Title by 15 points. Success on the field was matched by extensive ground developments off it. This was in thanks to a National Lottery Sports Fund grant. New changing rooms, offices and a floodlit all-weather pitch were constructed as part of the scheme to bring the facilities up to Wessex League standard. With the developments in place, the 1997-98 campaign saw a tense battle with Blackfield & Langley to see who would claim a spot in the Wessex league. Although Blackfield just pipped Moneys in the table, Moneyfields better facilities meant it was they who claimed promotion.

The first season in the Wessex League saw the club surprise many people by finishing 6th. The next couple of seasons saw the club post respectable top-ten finishes, but after finishing a disappointing 16th in 2000-01, George Wain and Micky Gee decided to step down after 13 seasons charge. Under the managerial trio of Calvin Hore, Terry Arnold and Paul Gregory, and then the duo of Craig Stafford and Miles Rutherford, the Club has established itself in the middle third of the table as well as embarking on a series of runs in the FA Cup and FA Vase.

The management line up was boosted in 2004-05 by the arrival of Bobby De Ste Croix and Alan Smith from Havant and Waterlooville. Where the duo managed to lead Moneys to mid-table finish, for 2 seasons in a row and reached the Final of the Portsmouth Senior Cup in 2005-06 losing 4-3 to Gosport Borough at West Leigh Park. In the 2006-07 Moneys reached the 3rd Round of the FA Vase, losing to AFC Totton.

The 2007-08 season saw the sudden departure mid-season of Craig Stafford, with the team ending the season in 7th position. Moneys were defeated in the League Cup Final, losing 1-0 against Wimborne Town. They also reached the 2nd Qualifying Round of the FA Cup, being knocked out by Team Bath at Dover Road.

2008-09 season Moneyfields had their best start to the season, leading the remaining 21 teams for a short period of time and seeing Moneys youth product Conor Bailey scoring Moneys 100th Goal of the season. The campaign ended positively with the First Team and Reserve Team both Finishing

third in their respective League Tables. While the 2009-10 season was Moneys worst season at home, with only 5 wins at Dover Road leaving the club in twelfth place. The Reserves ending the season in 4th place.

After 5 seasons in the Moneyfields Hot-Seat, Bobby De Ste Croix Retired as Manager. He was replaced by former Manager Micky Gee's son Graeme, who was also a very loyal player over the years at Moneyfields.

2010-11 season Moneys finished a respectable 7th place in the Wessex Premier League. Warren Hunt topped the goalscoring charts with a Club Record of 35 goals in a season. The Reserves finished 4th in the Wessex Combination League and finished Runners-Up in the Portsmouth Senior Cup Final losing 1-0 to Horndean. Moneys ended the following season [2011-12] in 4th position, with former

AFC Bournemouth Forward Steve Hutchings finishing top goalscorer, with 34 goals. The Reserves again finished 4th but this time in the newly formed Wyvern Combination League, another Portsmouth Senior Cup Final defeat was on the cards for the Reserves, as they were beaten 4-3 at Fratton Park by US Portsmouth. The Club bounced back in the 2012-13 campaign with a Portsmouth Senior Cup victory, but then were Runner-Ups once again in the 2014-15 Portsmouth Senior Cup.

The 2015-16 saw Moneyfields manager Miles Rutherford resign after 12 years in charge and was replaced with Dave Carter, who joined from fellow Wessex Premier Division side Horndean in October. Carter led Moneys to an 8th placed finish and Moneys also reached the 4th Round of the FA Vase. The Reserves ended the season 2nd in the Wyvern Combination League.

In Carter's first full season at Dover Road [2016-17] Moneyfields finished top of the table in Wessex League Premier Division. But only three days after the season ended, the FA took 3-points away for Moneys fielding an ineligible player giving the title to Portland United. Moneys still gained promotion to the Southern Football League Division One South-East.

Moneys ended their first season in the Southern Football League Division One South-East with a decent 10th placed finish. The Club also entered FA Trophy for the first in their history. 2018-19 Moneys won a place in the Play-Offs, after ending the season 4th in the League Table, on 71 points. Despite clinching a Play-Off place, it was made impossible for the Club to gain promotion due to technicalities. This was because of a League restructuring and there then being insufficient space in the Leagues above for all of the Play-Off winners to be promoted.

Moneyfields were placed in 18th when the 2019-20 season was abandoned and were also in the Portsmouth Senior Cup Quarter-Final and the Hampshire Senior Cup Semi-Final. Moneys played the remaining Portsmouth Senior Cup ties during the 2020-21 season and went onto win the Portsmouth Senior Cup against Baffins Milton Rovers at Fratton Park. In February 2021 Dave Carter stepped down to join AFC Portchester as Manager, so the two Louis' [Savage and Bell] took charge for our Portsmouth Senior Cup Semi-Final versus Fareham Town and for the Final.

The 2021-22 campaign was Moneys first season back in the Wessex League after voluntarily being relegated due to a loss over sponsorship and finance because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The team was under new management in Glenn Turnbull, Fraser Quirke, and Paul Barton, who joined from US Portsmouth. Moneys finished 9th in the League and made the Final of the Portsmouth Senior Cup, losing to Gosport Borough 4-1. The following season, Moneys played their home games at The Draper Tools Community Stadium [Home of Havant & Waterlooville] due to the redevelopment of Dover Road into the John Jenkins Stadium. The Club attendances were at an all-time high in the 2022-23 season, with gates averaging 230 per game, including a Club record attendance of 1,012 against AFC Portchester in a thrilling 3-3 draw on 27 December 2022.

On 13 April 2024, we beat Laverstock & Ford 4-2 away from home to clinch the Wessex Premier Division title, being the first team from Portsmouth to do so.

Moneyfields FC – Pen Pics

Glenn Turnbull [MGR] – Glenn joined the Club from US Portsmouth, who he took to the FA Vase Semi-Final in the 2020-21 and gained promotion from Wessex Division One with them. After three years at Moneys, he won the Wessex Premier Division title in the 2023-24 season.

Dylan Kramer [GK] – South African 'keeper Kramer signed in Sept 2022 from Baffins Milton Rovers, where he spent the opening months of the 2022/23 season after leaving US Portsmouth, where he had worked with Glenn Turnbull previously. He made his debut as a substitute in the FA Vase against Whitchurch United in Sept 2022.

Callum Smart [GK] – Callum joined the club from Gosport Borough in Nov 2024 where he has been number two for the past few seasons, while also getting first team football on Loan at Alresford Town, Fleet Town and Thatcham Town in recent seasons.

Tom Cain [DF] – Tom has been a big presence since joining the Club at the in 2021, signing from US Portsmouth. He picked up Manager's, Player's and Supporter's Player of the Year awards in his first season with Moneyfields. Tom had been on the injury list for some time and was a big boost to the side on his return at the start of the year.

Tom Jeffes [DF] – The veteran Defender signed for Moneys from Horndean in June 2023. He had previously worked with Glenn Turnbull at US Portsmouth and can often be utilised as a Centre-Forward, as he proved scoring in the 2023 Portsmouth Senior Cup Final for Horndean.

Ethan Gee [DF] – Ethan joins the Club after a spell with Andover New Street in the Wessex Premier Division. The left sided defender was formerly of Horndean, where he picked up a Wessex Premier Division winners medal in the 2022/23 season. Ethan appeared as a trialist in our pre-season games against Hamble Club and Havant & Waterlooville.

Harry Birmingham [DF] – The former AFC Portchester and US Portsmouth Defender signed at the beginning of the Glenn Turnbull era. 'Birmy' can operate across a back three and has also played at Right-Wing-Back on multiple occasions over the past couple season.

Ciaran Martin [DF] – Young left sided defender, signed on a work experience loan from Championship side Portsmouth at the start of October, making his debut in a 1-1 draw away against Hanworth Villa. Ciaran returned to Portsmouth over the Christmas period but resigned for Moneys on 20 Jan 2025 on loan until the end of the season.

Michael Ani [DF] – Michael joins Moneys on loan for the remainder of the season from Portsmouth. He has recently been on the bench for Portsmouth's first team, appearing on the team sheet vs Coventry City in the League and in the FA Cup vs Wycombe. Ani has the dexterity to play either full-back position or as a holding midfielder.

Marco De Sousa [WB] — Marco joined the Club from Sholing in 2023 where he was part of their U23 set-up, only appearing once for the First Team. Prior to this, the energetic Wing-Back was at Woodley United and was at Reading as an academy player. In his debut campaign with Moneys he picked up the Supporter's Player of the Season award.

Eric Dellaud [WB] - A 2023 summer signing from Chichester City, the left sided defender comes highly rated and was with the academy of Premier League side Brighton & Hove Albion. He was with Moneys on a dual registration basis during the 2022/23 season, before signing permanently last season, after a short spell with Bognor Regis Town.

Harry Sargeant [MF] – Sargeant is another former US Portsmouth player in the squad. The tough tackling Midfield player joined Moneys from Baffins Milton Rovers 2022 and has impressed ever since. 'Sarge' enjoyed his return to Baffins at the start of the 2023/24 season, finding the back of the net, in a 3-2 Moneys victory.

Joel Brown [MF] - Joel signed on loan from Dorking Wanderers in Oct 2024. The midfielder has slowly broke into the Dorking first team since their relegation to the National League South, making 2 apps off the bench and even scoring at Aveley. Joel is a regular in the Dorking B Team, where he has made over 50 apps, while still 18 years-old.

Lawrence Cooper [MF] – Defender/Midfielder Cooper, signed for the Club from Horndean in June 2022. The Midfielder can also operate as a Sweeper or as a Wing-Back. He scored his first 2 goals for the Club in the latter stages of the 2023/24 season, against Baffins Milton Rovers and a goal of the season contender versus US Portsmouth.

Jordan Pile [MF] – The left-footed creative midfielder joins the Club from Horndean, where he had played the previous 18 months after departing Moneys in the summer of 2023. Prior to his first spell at Moneys, JP was part of the USP squad that reached the FA Vase semifinal.

Steve Ramsey [MF] – 'Rambo' left AFC Portchester in the Summer of 2023 to link up for the second time with Moneys, although his first stint was a very brief spell back in the 2018/19 season. The imposing Central-Midfielder holds the record appearances for Portchy as well as appearing 220 times in the National League South with Havant & Waterlooville.

Yuvraj Landa [MF] – Landa, who plays in midfield, joins us on a dual-registration from Eastleigh. He played for Hythe & Dibden during the 2023/24 season making 9 appearances, while also being a part of the Eastleigh academy side that defeated Portsmouth in the FA Youth Cup.

George Barker [MF] – This is George's second spell at Moneyfields, having previously played in the curtailed 2020/21 season. The former Brighton & Hove Albion pro re-joins us having spent just over three seasons playing for AFC Portchester. The attacking-midfielder can name Swindon Town and Tranmere Rovers amongst some of his former clubs.

Harry Thorpe [FW] – Harry joined Moneys in December on loan from Aldershot Town until the end of the season. The attacking-midfielder formerly of Grimsby Town, had a 9-game loan spell with Thatcham Town earlier in the season where he shared the pitch with our Goalkeeper, Callum Smart.

James Franklyn [FW] – 'The Lord' is another who signed from US Portsmouth. Franklyn was used predominantly as a Right-Back at USP before Turnbull moved him into an Attacking-Midfield role, where he has scored 37 goals for Moneys and 42 over the two seasons previous to that. Franklyn has also previously played for Folland Sports.

Callum Laycock [FW] – Signed from AFC Stoneham in June 2022, the Forward made an instant impact at Moneys, hitting national headlines after scoring 5 goals in the FA Cup against Bemerton Heath. He won the Supporter's Player of the Year in his first season, and last season he scored 43 goals in all comps. and won Player's Player of the Year award.

Jafer Mahammedkier [FW] – Jafer signed in July 2024 from Havant & Waterlooville while at the Hawks' he also spent a short period of time on loan at Horndean in the 2023/24 season. The lively Centre-Forward made a handful of appearance at Westleigh Park, even scoring 4 goals against US Portsmouth in the Portsmouth Senior Cup.
