Good afternoon, today we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Harrow Borough FC for this Isthmian League South Central Division match. We also welcome our officials, Referee Thomas Cartwright & Assistants Alfie Watts & Pavlos Anastasi We trust that you will enjoy your stay, and we wish you all a safe journey home afterwards.

Harrow Borough come to us today sitting in 8th place, with 36 points from their 23 matches. Fair to say they have suffered something of a dip in form recently, picking up just seven points from their last six matches – and with a heavy 3-0 reverse at Ashford Town last Saturday, they will be very keen to rediscover their early season form. We then quickly renew acquaintances with Southall as we play them here on Tues 7th January in the quarter final of the Middlesex Charity Cup. We are then on the road again the following week when we travel to Leatherhead on Saturday 11th January.

Match Report

Saturday 28th December Uxbridge 2-1 Kingstonian

One Moore Time

Those days between Christmas and New Year are usually rather soporific, with leftover Turkey to be eaten and nobody really sure what day it is - well anyone at Honeycroft on Saturday will have been awoken from their slumber by a rousing display from Uxbridge as they saw off 2nd place Kingstonian with a late late winner from talismanic forward George Moore.

With both teams in good form, and one place separating the sides, this was always going to be a tight affair, but it was the home side who made the early running. On 2 mins George Moore found himself in the box chasing a through ball, only for Liam Allen to clumsily take the ball and man - however the referee waved play on with Moore left prone on the ground. 4 minutes later the impressive CJ Fearn came up from the back at a corner and the ball fell to him 8 yards out, but he fizzed his shot just wide of the far post. K's were passing the ball nicely now, and having plenty of possession, they broke on 10 minutes and a fine cross was met by Eddie Simon on the stretch, but the prolific marksman this time was unable to keep the ball down - but the warning signs were there. Uxbridge though also looked dangerous and on 27 minutes Josh Addae broke into the box and fed Moore to have a shot that cannoned off the defenders arm -to earn the home side a penalty. However, Liam Allen produced a fine save at full stretch to his left to keep out Addae's effort. Within 2 minutes the miss was compounded as Eddie Simon was played in, and he made no mistake to calmly slot the ball past George Legg to give K's the lead. The reds didn't let their heads drop though, and shortly after Allen had denied Addae with a low save, they did level things up on 36 minutes as a fine low cross from Moore found Ada Okorogheye in space at the far post to slide in the equaliser with the defence beaten. Late on a coming

together between Luke Paris at full stretch and Joe Pratley Jones - saw the K's defender leave the field injured - a fate that would also befall Paris over the interval.

HT 1-1

The second half began slowly, with neither side really able to exert themselves on the game - Uxbridge's defence was being well marshalled by Fearn, but the captain had to be on his toes on 56 minutes to get back well to block a goalbound effort with Legg beaten. Two minutes later it looked as though the Reds had taken the lead, but a cross from Okorogheye was adjudged to have gone out before Fabio Sole's header went in and so 1-1 it stayed. The final twenty-five minutes saw Uxbridge take control of the game, and they produced a string of chances -only to be met by an inspired performance from Allen in the K's goal. On 65 minutes it was Moore who did superbly to break a couple of tackles, but Allen was out smartly to block the shot, minutes later it was Massimo Giamattei who saw his shot saved, Toby Nnadozie would also be denied as he stung the keepers hands with a shot from the edge of the box. Allen was finally beaten on 73 minutes, but Moore's superb turn and shot cannoned back off the bar and was tidied up by the defender. Chances were now coming thick and fast, on 76 minutes Fearn's header from a corner looked destined to go in but went agonisingly past the post. As the game entered the final ten minutes the home side continued to create chances, Leo Decabo went close on 2 occasions, but again Allen was more than up to the task. As the game ticked into stoppage time, it looked like the points would be shared - however Moore had other ideas and a ball into the box was superbly taken down by Okorogheye, he laid the ball off to Moore on the edge of the 18-yard box and he smashed the ball on the half volley past the despairing dive of Liam Allen, to send the home players and fans delirious.

The win cements Uxbridge's place in the playoffs, and they can look forward to 2025 with some optimism - starting with the visit of Harrow Borough on New Year's Day

CHRISTMAS time is for giving as they say, well the fixtures computer has certainly served up a festive treat for Non-League fans everywhere this yuletide. Traditionally, the Boxing Day fixtures are one of the first fans look out for when the schedule is announced – and this year hasn't disappointed with a number of crunch derby clashes taking place up and down the country.

Whatever the level, you just can't beat a derby-day cracker to complete your Christmas, so here are just a few that have caught the eye of our NLP groundhoppers. The National League always seems to serve up a Boxing Day feast with all the trimmings – and the Aldershot Town v Woking derby is usually at the forefront. Just 12 miles separate these rival clubs, just across the Surrey/Hampshire border, ensuring there's never any shortage of drama for the big crowds on show. There's a Tyne-Tees affair when Gateshead and Hartlepool United meet at the International Stadium, while Dagenham v Braintree and Southend United v Ebbsfleet United ensure that Essex and Kent are well represented on the day,

At Step 2, Brackley Town and Leamington looks tasty in National League North, similarly the Derbyshire dual between Buxton and Alfreton Town and an 'Old Farm' East Anglian derby with King's Lynn Town hosting Needham Market. A big day in the north-east is further demonstrated by Darlington v Scarborough Athletic and Spennymoor Town v South Shields, not to mention Stockton Town v Hebburn Town in the Northern Premier League, Premier Division at Step 3. The South is equally as intriguing, An all-Hertfordshire clash between Hemel Hempstead Town and St Albans City is a worthy headline act, while Aveley versus Hornchurch and Tonbridge Angels v Maidstone United are big games in Essex and Kent respectively. Chippenham Town v Bath City is often a tasty affair also. The NPL also serves us up with Matlock Town v Ilkeston Town and Bamber Bridge v Lancaster City, while at Step 4 there are two more all-north east affairs between Bishop Auckland and Consett and Dunston v Newton Aycliffe. AFC Rushden & Diamonds v Corby Town is always an eagerly-awaited affair in their respective parts of Northamptonshire, while in an ultracongested Midlands division, packed with local affairs, unbeaten Quorn and Shepshed Dynamo, separated by just seven miles, battle it out in Leicestershire.

All eyes in Manchester will be on Wythenshawe when bitter rivals FC and Town meet at Hollyhedge Park, while Hednesford Town v Stafford Rangers looks a Boxing Day battle of heavyweights to rival Usyk and Fury. The Southern League Premier Central is always full of crunch local affairs and Boxing Day doesn't disappoint with AFC Telford United and Halesowen Town or Bromsgrove Sporting v Stourbridge arguably the pick.

The Somerset clash between Tiverton Town and Taunton Town always whets the appetite in the west country, while Havant & Waterlooville and Gosport Borough love a battle on the south coast.

And if you're in or around the Beaconsfield area of Buckinghamshire then why not make the trip to Holloways Park where they take on close rivals Flackwell Heath in a lunchtime showdown. In the Isthmian League, the all-Essex affair between Billericay Town and Canvey Island gets the juices flowing, as does the Sussex derby between Horsham v Bognor Regis Town and the north London clash between Hendon and Potters Bar Town. Margate versus Ramsgate is undoubtedly the game of the day in Step 4 as the two Kent coast promotion rivals lock horns, while Hartley Wintney v Farnham Town, a local battle of third versus first, is also well worth a visit.

At Step 5 and 6, of course, derbies are a little more commonplace but there are a few, mainly, cross-town affairs that are sure to whet the appetite of the locals. 1874 Northwich v Northwich Victoria ticks all the boxes for a Boxing Day bonanza, as does Newcastle Benfield v Newcastle Bue Star in Ebac Northern League Division One. And division two produces two more in the form of Chester-Le-Street Town versus Chester-Le-Street United and Sunderland West End v Sunderland RCA. The lunchtime affair in the United Counties League Premier North between Newark & Sherwood and Newark Town bares all the hallmarks of a cracker, similarly Northampton ON Chenecks v Northampton Sileby Rangers in Premier South and the Division One fixture between Retford United and Retford. And, if you're on your holidays on the Isle of Wight and missing your football fix, then how about East Cowes Victoria v Newport (IoW) in the Wessex League.

Wherever you are in the country, you're never far from a crunch local derby to savour. Combining the spirit of Non-League with the spirit of Christmas, it's truly one of the highlights of the football calendar. But wherever you go and whatever you do, The NLP wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Returned to Honeycroft last season from Harrow Borough and had a great season which saw him crowned player of the year. Combative midfielder who made his Reds debut in 2014 aged nineteen.

George Moore (Midfield)

Attacking midfielder who joined us from Harrow Borough in 2023. Last season's top scorer, which saw him voted Supporters Player of the year. Was regularly amongst the goals at Step 3.

Andrio Brandao (Midfield)

Skilful, attacking midfielder who joined from Virginia Water last season. Made a big impression during the latter part of the campaign and everyone at the club is excited to watch his progress this season.

Wilson Chingoka (Midfielder)

All action midfielder who joined the club in January 2024. Big personality who has experience at Step 3. Previous clubs include Nuneaton Borough, Potters Bar Town, Lewes, Bedford Town, Staines Town and Northwood.

Leo Donnellan (Midfielder)

Former QPR youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

Glenn Yala (Defender/Midfield)

Played at Chalfont St Peter for Manager Danny Edwards. Vastly experienced player whose versatility makes him a managers dream. Former North Greenford United, Waltham Abbey, Aylesbury, Hanwell Town and Chertsey Town player.

Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

Ada Okorogheye (Forward)

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

.Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. Alocal solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under thisname in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" wasborn. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to reestablish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A reorganisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994,1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Chairty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

Harrow Borough FC Club History

Roxonian FC was founded in the summer of 1933. The Club spent their first season in the Harrow and District League (playing their home games at a ground on Northolt Road), finishing runners-up in Division 1. They were accepted into the Spartan League, which coincided with the move to Earlsmead.

1938 saw Roxonian finish runners-up in Division 2 (West), but they had to wait for promotion until the following season, as only the champions went up. This was achieved under the new name of Harrow Town. War intervened though the Club continued to play in, first, the West Middlesex Combination, then the Middlesex Senior League. Peace brought a return to the Spartan League until 1958 when runners-up spot enabled the Club to move to the Delphian League. 5 seasons were spent here, until mergers saw Town accepted into Division 2 of the Athenian League in 1963.

In their first season at this level they finished runners-up, denied the championship only by goal difference. However, only 3 seasons were spent in Division 1, whence a name change to Harrow Borough coincided with relegation in 1967. 8 seasons were played as occupants of Division 2, during which it seemed that the club might withdraw from senior football, and only the efforts of a few hardy individuals kept the Club alive.

Negotiations with the local council saw the Club sell its second pitch, now the site of a school, and build a new clubhouse, floodlights and terracing. This progress was matched on the field; Boro' were elected to the Isthmian League in 1975 after having to wait a year for the complex to be completed. 4 years later they won promotion to the Premier Division as runners-up.

The early 1980s saw the Club's most successful spell so far. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won in 1980, the Middlesex Senior Cup three years later. Also, in 1983 Harrow Borough reached the semi-finals of the FA Trophy, losing to the eventual winners, Telford United, over two legs.

A year later, the Club's Golden Jubilee was celebrated with a drawn match against Manchester United; Harrow's best FA Cup run so far, losing to Newport County (then of the old Football League Division 3) in the 2nd Round Proper; and, best of all, winning the Isthmian League Premier Division championship by a staggering 17-point margin.

Under astute manager Micky Tomkys, Harrow had enjoyed continuous success but his retirement in 1986 saw a gradual decline in the Club's fortunes. On three occasions a win in the final game of the season was required to enable the club to retain their treasured Isthmian Premier Division status.

1992/93, however, saw a dramatic improvement, with both the Middlesex Senior Cup and Middlesex Charity Cup returning to Earlsmead. The semi-final of the latter saw Chelsea defeated 4-1. A league placing of 8th was also their best for 6 seasons. This form continued over the next three seasons under the management team of Harry Manoe, with the Club finishing 9th in 1993-94, 10th 1994-95 and 9th again in 1996-97. A dip in the Club's fortunes saw his departure, to be followed by a succession of managers. A disastrous run of form during the 1999/2000 season saw the Club avoid relegation by just a single goal.

Despite an encouraging start to the season to the 2000/01 season, which saw Boro' reach the First Round Proper of the FA Cup for only the second time (losing 0-3 to a Wycombe Wanderers side that went on to the semi-finals), a poor run of performances after Christmas saw the Club finish 4th from bottom again with just 2 points to spare.

2001-02 saw the club commence a long-term plan, targeting youth development. As well as fielding a young side, which managed to retain Premier Division status once more, close partnerships were formed with local youth football clubs. The summer of 2004 saw the formation of an Allied Counties under 18's squad, designed to bridge the gap between youth and senior football.

Under the stewardship of manager David Howell, Boro' continued their youth and community development and they now have links with a number of local youth football clubs and schools.

Season 2006/07 saw Boro' finish in a relegation position only for their Premier Division place to be saved by Lancaster City whose financial difficulties saw them being relegated instead.

On a pleasanter note, season 2005-06 saw Boro' win the Middlesex Senior Charity Cup for the third time with a 2-0 success over Enfield Town. Season 2006-07 saw the feat replicated with victory over Brook House 5-4 on penalties following a 0-0 scoreline. Season 2008-09 saw Boro' finish as Runners-Up in the Isthmian League Cup, losing out to Tilbury 2-0 in the Final played on the ground of Staines Town FC. That season also saw Boro' reach the Semi Final of the London Senior Cup, a competition which they had entered for the first time in a considerable number of years.

Enforced cost cutting during the summer of 2008 saw the Club resigning its membership of the Allied Counties Youth League. This proved to be only a one-season absence from youth team football as Boro' entered the expanded Ryman Youth League for the 2009-10 season.

Season 2009-10 saw Boro' finish in a very creditable 14th position in the Ryman Premier Division, At Reserve Team level Boro's Capital League side, under the stewardship of Stuart Crawford, brought much success to the Club by winning the double of the Capital League: Western Division Title to go along with that of Capital League: President's Challenge Cup winners. Added to the fact that Boro' had cleared their longstanding debt with HM Revenue & Customs and the Club entered the 2010-11 season with new found optimism.

A final position of 5th at the end of that season was their highest placing for a considerable number of years and earned the Club a place in the end of season play-offs for promotion to the Conference South. Defeat at Tonbridge Angels in extra time in the Semi Finals saw an end for the time being of that dream but it was still a brilliant season for the Club. And Boro' were the highest goalscorers in the Ryman Premier Division with 77 goals scored. They also reached the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, losing out narrowly to the eventual League Two Champions, Chesterfield, in front of the TV cameras at Earlsmead.

But during the summer Boro' received shock news that Manager David Howell had decided to resign his position, taking with him his Assistant, Ken Charlery, and the other members of his Management Team. This meant a hard summer for the Boro' Board and for new manager Dave Anderson who returned to the Club he had served previously as Reserve Team Manager and then Assistant Manager on three separate occasions. Dave added the vastly experienced Jason Goodliffe to his Management Team and with a completely new team on the pitch a final league position of 17th was very acceptable after what was a very difficult season.

The summer of 2012 saw the experienced Darron Wilkinson join the Management Team and a gradual improvement on the pitch saw Boro' finish in a very creditable 15th place.

The summer of 2013 saw Asst Manager Jason Goodliffe depart to take up a similar position at Football League Division One side Stevenage with Mark Faulkner replacing him on the Management Team. Off the field an important addition was The Axis Group who became the Club's new Main Sponsors.

A disastrous run of form however saw Dave Anderson and Mark Faulkner leaving the Club towards the end of January 2015 with Steve Baker formerly of Chipstead FC taking over at the helm. He brought with him Jesse Smith in the role of Assistant Manager and retained the services of the popular Darron Wilkinson in a three-man management team with the aim of retaining the Club's long held Premier Division status. This was achieved in magnificent style with the side picking up 28 points from the remaining 15 league games and finishing the season in 16th position. In addition, they won both the Middlesex Senior Cup - defeating Hanwell Town 1-0 in the final which was played at Hampton & Richmond Borough - and the Middlesex Senior Charity Cup - defeating Cockfosters 3-0 with that game being played at Earlsmead.

The 2015-16 season saw Boro' finish in a comfortable 17th position having picked up 54 points from the 46 games played.

The 2016-17 season began on a high note for Boro' and a tremendous run in The FA Cup saw the side reach the First Round Proper of the competition. Handed an away tie against League One side Northampton Town, a 6-0 reverse saw the end of that adventure for another season.

Unfortunately, a run of poor results during late March and April saw the Club finish in a relegation position only for the plight of Worcester City to see Boro' reprieved for a second time in 11 years.

The 2017-18 season started brightly enough and Boro' topped the league briefly but a period of struggle followed, lasting into early January. Following a series of internal meetings changes were made to the playing squad and this led to a significant improvement in performances and an eventual 12th position in the League Table.

The summer of 2018 also saw everyone at Harrow take great pride in the selection of our former goalkeeper Nick Pope to the England World Cup squad. When he made his England debut against Costa Rica, he became the first ex-Harrow player to win a full international cap for England.

Then came the announcement all at The Rogers Family Stadium had feared for some little while – as part of the restructuring of The Non-League Pyramid, Boro' were to be transferred to the Southern Football League along with Hendon, Metropolitan Police, Staines Town and newly promoted Walton Casuals. The Club and its supporters decided to embrace this change in a very positive manner and an enjoyable season followed with Boro' finishing in 7th position having picked up 63 points from 42 games. Boro' were also joint highest goalscorers in the Division with 97. Additionally, they were Runners-up in the Middlesex Senior Cup losing out to Championship League side Brentford in the Final, which was played at Brentford FC's Griffin Park ground, soon to be closed.

Both the 2019-20 and 2020-21 seasons were to be curtailed due to COVID-19. Despite the considerable problems caused first, by the restrictions on social gatherings leading to a reduction in bar takings and hall bookings - both major sources of the club's revenue - and then by the complete closure of the club premises. Good contacts were maintained with the playing squad, and many remained with the side when the 2021-22 season began. A poor start saw only three points gathered from the first five league games, but from the start of September a great run saw 13 wins out of 15, and progress through four qualifying rounds of the FA Cup, to reach the First Round Proper for the fifth time in the club's history. There were celebrations in the club when Wes Morgan drew our ball out to give us Harrow a tie at Portsmouth, a game that was watched by the largest crowd ever to watch Harrow Borough. It gave Steve Baker and his squad a chance to test themselves against opponents from four tiers higher, and although they lost, they did so with enormous dignity, only going down 1-0. The season ended with Boro' finishing in a very creditable 14th position in the Southern League Premier Division South League Table.

2022/23 saw a season of struggle in the league which eventually saw Boro' finishing in a relegation position, only to be reprieved yet again this time as a result of Metropolitan Police taking voluntary relegation and thus our place at Step 4. The only bright spark was a run in The FA Trophy which saw us defeated, in a penalty shoot-out, by the eventual winners, AFC Halifax Town in the 4th Round Proper. Steve Baker became the longest serving manager in the club's history during the course of the season but announced he would be leaving the post at the end of the campaign.

2023/24 saw the inevitable happen with Boro' finishing in 21st position in the league table and relegation to the Isthmian League South Central being confirmed. Jordan Berry and his management team left at the season's end, being replaced by Ben Bukowski (Manager) supported by Keegan Cole (Assistant Manager), Dennis Quigley (1st Team Coach) and Nicolai Collins (goalkeeping coach).
