# Match Report

**Uxbridge 2-4 Southall**

*Middlesex Charity Cup – Quarter Final*

## Charity Doesn't begin at home

Uxbridge's defence of the Middlesex Charity Cup ended at the first hurdle this season, as Southall ran out 4-2 winners on a bitterly cold Tuesday evening at Honeycroft.

It was a fairly open game with both teams having periods in the ascendancy, it was the home side who made most of the early running though – and Alex Witham had the first real chance on 13 minutes, when he headed narrowly wide from a throw into the box. Southall though came into their own and created their own chances, notably on 20 minutes when a fine cross came onto the box, with the Uxbridge defence beaten – but the ball evaded everyone and went behind. The reprieve was short-lived however as the visitors took the lead one minute later when the ball dropped to Ryan Hope outside the box – and his fierce shot took a wicked deflection to leave George Legg stranded and the ball ended up in the net. Five minutes later though, Legg was called into action to superbly deny 2 Southall chances when it looked easier to score. Again, though Southall didn't get disheartened and doubled their lead just past the half hour when a defensive mix up allowed Jaden Thompson-Brissett to score into an empty net. Southall may have harboured thoughts of a half time lead, but that rapidly changed, as firstly on 37 mins Wilson Chingoka outpaced the last defender and clipped a fine finish over Milan Czerwonka in the Southall goal. Right on the half time whistle came a moment of real brilliance from Uxbridge defender James Taylor, as he picked up a loose ball on the half way line and unleashed a fully 50 yard shot that dipped over Czerwonka - to leave everyone in the ground in amazement. One of the best goals Honeycroft will have seen for many a year.

## HT 2-2

As the frost formed on the pitch in the second half, Uxbridge were the ones making the early running. An early corner was scrambled away at the last minute by Southall, and then Czerwonka was at full stretch to deny Alex Witham. As the half wore on, Southall got stronger and created the better chances, Legg needing to be at his best to tip over an excellent shot from Brendan Matthew on 69 minutes. Matthew wasn't to be denied two minutes though as he held off a few defenders and then slotted the ball into the corner. A flurry of substitutions and injuries then interrupted the flow of the game, and in fact Uxbridge ended up with back up goalkeeper Adam Hasaane having to play as a makeshift striker. Southall in truth were in control now, and when Uxbridge did get a late throw on the edge of the box, Legg came up from the back – so there were 3 goalkeepers in the Southall box at that point – unfortunately the ball fell kindly to Makael Scott to pick up the ball and run unopposed the full length of the field and put Southall into the Semi Final.

A disappointing end, but Uxbridge will now be free to concentrate on the league.

# Match Report

**Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> January**  
**Moneyfields 2-0 Uxbridge**

A January midweek trip down to Portsmouth turned into anything but a nice trip to the coast as Uxbridge went down to two second half penalties on Tuesday evening.

To call the first half low-key would be something of an understatement, as neither side were able to fashion any chances of note in the opening 15 minutes. The Reds were without their leading scorer George Moore, and the best chance of the half fell to new signing Jonathan Hippolyte but his header went wide from a fine Kai Hobbs Cross. Just before the half hour George Legg was called into action to superbly deny Harry Thorpe tipping over his shot when he had broken clear of the visitors defence. Minutes later Ada Okorogheye robbed the defender but was crowded out and his shot was deflected back to the keeper – it would be Uxbridge’s best chance of the remainder of the match – with 5 minutes of the half-left Luke Paris received his second yellow card for the evening for a late tackle – and Uxbridge knew they would be up against it from then on. It was almost an immediate advantage though as on 41 minutes only some last ditch defending from James Taylor kept the ball out after a goalmouth scramble. But it would set the tone for the second half.

## HT 0-0

Moneyfields started on the front foot in the second half, Tom Jeffes should have done better on 46 minutes when he rose highest from a corner but put the ball well over the bar when it seemed easier to score. The game then drifted, with Uxbridge happy to sit deep and soak up the pressure, while the home side were unable to break them down. Steve Ramsey did make space for a shot on 66 minutes, but Legg was left untroubled. However, the home side were then gifted a chance on 67 minutes when Toby Nnadozie handled the ball in the box, and a penalty was awarded which Scott Hills tucked away beyond the reach of Legg. It got worse 7 minutes later as this time Hobbs handled the ball in the Moneyfields box, and a second penalty was the outcome. This time Hills send Legg the wrong way to double to home sides lead. Uxbridge then struggled to create anything of note, and in fact Moneyfields could have added a third late on when Steve Ramsey curled a shot onto the post with Legg beaten. However, 2-0 it stayed to leave Uxbridge nursing their bruises and returning to Honeycroft for the visit of Raynes Park Vale this coming Saturday.

TAMWORTH's heroics aside, the most romantic story of FA Cup third round weekend was one which never actually materialised. In 154 years of the competition, no father and son have ever played against each other, so when Premier League Everton pulled Peterborough United out of the hat, all talk was of the possibility of Everton full-back Ashley Young facing his 18-year-old son Tyler.

Tyler was named on the Posh bench but, in the end, a tight game at Goodison Park meant that Peterborough boss Darren Ferguson had to put the needs of his team before the purists and the young midfielder didn't get on. And in another twist to the tale, Ashley's brother, and Tyler's uncle, Lewis Young took charge of only his second game as caretaker manager, leading out Dagenham & Redbridge at Millwall on Monday night. Despite not quite etching their names in cup folklore, it proved a memorable weekend for the Young family – one to tell the grandchildren one day.

"It was fantastic to be there [at Everton] on Thursday night," Lewis told *The NLP*. It was a dream for me and the whole family all dotted around. "We probably ended up making it nearly a sell out because the amount of us went up."

Ask any footballer of a certain age and they'll tell you it's every player's dream to see their son or daughter make their own way in the game – better still playing alongside them. And that was the case for two former full-time stalwarts who lined up alongside their sons in Non-League last week.

Ronnie Henry says he has fulfilled the final ambition of his 23-year playing career after playing alongside son Louie for Potters Bar. Stevenage legend Henry, 41, joined the Scholars in June after watching 17-year-old Louie play at the Lantern on loan from his former club last season.

The centre-back even admitted that the possibility of left-back Louie returning to the Isthmian Premier division side had convinced him not to hang up his boots. Henry was made to sweat, with talk of loan moves elsewhere, but the deal was completed last week and on Tuesday night the pair lined up in Max Mitchell's back four, helping the Scholars to a 2-1 win at Canvey Island.

"I've achieved quite a few things in my career, but playing alongside Louie is right up there with any of them," Henry, who won two FA Trophies, a Conference title and the League Two play-offs during two glittering spells at the Lamex, told *The NLP*. "When I decided to play on for another year, it did depend on what Louie was going to do. And at times it looked like he would go elsewhere. So for him to come to Potters Bar and for me to play alongside him was a special, special moment.

"It's a moment that I didn't think was ever going to happen. I didn't even dream of it happening, to be honest. Even driving to the game, I thought 'This is surreal'. But when we crossed that white line, everything just felt really natural. "It was a fantastic experience and it almost feels like 'OK, I've achieved everything I could have hoped for in football now'."










Someone who knows exactly how Henry is feeling right now is Danny Kedwell. The Ashford United player/manager says it's an "amazing feeling" to partner his son in the Nuts & Bolts front line in the Isthmian South East division – even though he'd really rather not to! Kedwell has been forced to dust down his predatory scoring boots in recent weeks at the age of 41 to cover an injury and suspension crisis at the Homelands, which has propelled his 16-year-old schoolboy son Preston into the spotlight having netted three goals in his first six starts in senior football.

"He's only 16, he's still at school, so to get experience of men's football at his age is fantastic," said Kedwell Snr, who scored over 250 career goals for the likes of AFC Wimbledon, Gillingham and Ebbsfleet United. "In all my footballing career, I never thought I would ever be playing alongside my son.

"It's an amazing feeling, albeit unexpected because I don't really want to be playing at 41 to be honest! But with all the injuries and suspensions we've had, I had no choice. "I was buzzing for him, because it's hard for him being 16 years of age and the manager's son. "It's an easy option not to play him but he doesn't deserve that. He's had six starts this season and got three goals. As a manager, if I think you are good enough to play then you'll play, and I'll treat you the same as anyone else.

"When it comes to matchday, he's just a normal player. He's deserved his start like anyone else. He's been patient and every time he's come on he's done really well. "He's a natural goalscorer. He knows where the goal is and has a habit of being in the right place at the right time, You just can't buy that."

Has moved up the ranks at Honeycroft having played for the Reds Youth and Under 23 sides. Re-joined the Club in September 2024 from Amersham Town. Pacey full back who likes to get forward.

Former Crystal Palace youngster who signed for the Eagles from Langley FC. Fleet footed full back who likes to get forward. Made his Reds debut at Kingstonian in August 2024.

**Alex Witham (Midfield)**

Former Arsenal youngster who played alongside Jack Wilshire for the Gunners. Talented player who is in his fourth season at Honeycroft. Former player of the year who has made over 100 appearances for the Reds.

**Leo Decabo (Midfield)**

Leo joined The Reds in September 2024 from Hartley Wintney and made an instant impact with two goals on his debut against Pheonix Sports in the FA Trophy. Scored an impressive 22 goals for Burnham last season.

**Reece Robins (Midfield)**

Attacking midfielder who began his career at Walton Casuals. Part of the successful Leighton Town side, played at Badshot Lea and Chertsey Town last season.

**Lewis Cole (Midfield)**

Returned to Honeycroft last season from Harrow Borough and had a great season which saw him crowned player of the year. Combative midfielder who made his Reds debut in 2014 aged nineteen.

**George Moore (Midfield)**

Attacking midfielder who joined us from Harrow Borough in 2023. Last season's top scorer, which saw him voted Supporters Player of the year. Was regularly amongst the goals at Step 3.

**Andrio Brandao (Midfield)**

Skilful, attacking midfielder who joined from Virginia Water last season. Made a big impression during the latter part of the campaign and everyone at the club is excited to watch his progress this season.

**Wilson Chingoka (Midfielder)**

All action midfielder who joined the club in January 2024. Big personality who has experience at Step 3. Previous clubs include Nuneaton Borough, Potters Bar Town, Lewes, Bedford Town, Staines Town and Northwood.

**Leo Donnellan (Midfielder)**

Former QPR youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

**Glenn Yala (Defender/Midfield)**

Played at Chalfont St Peter for Manager Danny Edwards. Vastly experienced player whose versatility makes him a managers dream. Former North Greenford United, Waltham Abbey, Aylesbury, Hanwell Town and Chertsey Town player.

**Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)**

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

**Ada Okorogheye (Forward)**

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

## Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. A local solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under this name in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" was born. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesbrough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to re-establish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A re-organisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994, 1997 and 2000.

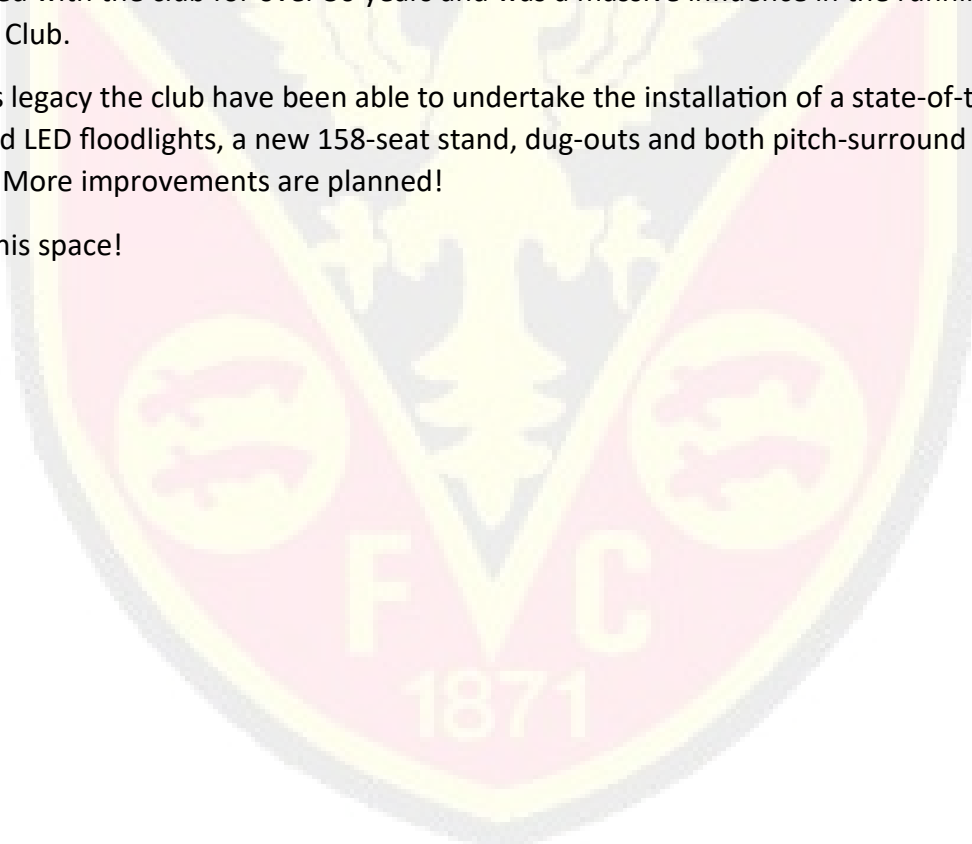
They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Chaiyrt Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

# Raynes Park Vale FC - Club History

Raynes Park Vale FC was formed in 1995 following the merger of Raynes Park and Malden Vale (formed 1967) but the club's true origins lie in the Southern Railway Football Section when the first local team started. Although a victim of the 1963 Beeching spending cuts the club had some early successes in the 1932/33 Middlesex League and some cup victories to earn the Railway Athletic Association Cup and the Southern Railways Orphanage Cup.

The Southern Railway club reformed, post-Beeching, as Raynes Park FC in 1964. RPF's home colours of black and red stripes are now proudly reflected in the colours of the Raynes Park Vale FC team. Raynes Park FC fielded five senior teams with two playing in the Surrey Premier League and a third in the Surrey South- Eastern Combination

In the meantime, local team Malden Vale FC were enjoying some success in a variety of leagues that existed between 1967 and 1995 including the North Surrey Youth League, Sunday Sportsman League, South Thameside League & the Surrey Combination League and London Spartan League before emerging into the newly formed Combined Counties League winning that league's title at the first attempt.

A runners-up position in the Dan Air League (with BAE Weybridge snagging the top spot) saw the club promoted to the Diadora League Division 2 South where they remained until the end of the 1993/94 season when managers Mick Brown & Ged Murphy left the club to join Hendon. Much of the squad followed and the team finished bottom the following season. In 1995 the two clubs, Malden Vale and Raynes Park FC merged to create the club we now know: Raynes Park Vale F.C.

The new club immediately joined the Combined Counties Football League and currently play in the league's Premier League, Tier 9 in the national league pyramid. Their best finish was in 1997–98 when they finished in fourth place at tier 9. They have participated in both national Cup competitions apart from a brief period at the start of the 2000s. The club's reserve team won the Combined Counties Reserve League in 2002–03 and 2005–06 before it joined the Suburban League for the 2006–07 season. The reserve team was disbanded for financial reasons before rejoining the combined counties reserve league for the 2011-12 season under the management of Terry Tuvey. In the 2012-13 season the reserves achieved the league & cup double. The cup being won with a 2-0 win against Worcester Park Reserves in the final. The Reserves also won the fair Play award in both 2011/12 & 2012/13, the 1st team winning the Premier award in 2011//12. The Combined Counties League took the decision to disband the reserve league at the end of the 2012/13 season so for the 2013/14 season they re-joined the Suburban League.

Midway through 2013/14 Lee Dobinson stepped down as 1st Team Manager to take over as Club Chairman from Fred Stevens. Former AFC Wimbledon Player Gavin Bolger stepped up to take over as 1st team Manager. Gavin Bolger played 107 times for AFC Wimbledon from 2002 to May 2005 scoring 27 goals from midfield.

The 2019/20 season saw some major changes in the organisation and management of the club with local businessman and supporter John Dalton becoming Chairman and Josh Gallagher replacing Gavin Bolger as manager at the start of the 20/21 season.

Extensive restructuring and refinancing of the club saw Raynes Park Vale mount a record-breaking FA Vase campaign in 21/22 and narrowly miss out on promotion. Raynes Park Vale F.C. were the winners of The Combined Counties Premier Division South 2022/23 and were promoted to The Isthmian South-Central Division First Division
