Welcome to Uxbridge FC

Good afternoon, today we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Kingstonian FC for this Isthmian League South Central Division match. We also welcome our officials, Referee Zak Demetriades & Assistants Marc Rister & Terence Dawkins. We trust that you will enjoy your stay, and we wish you all a safe journey home afterwards.

Kingstonian come to us having had a good season so far; after being relegated from the Isthmian League Premier Division last season the K's have adjusted well to the division and are sitting in 2nd place, with 47 points from their 20 matches. Recent form has seen them lose only one of their last six matches, with a surprise 1-0 reverse at home to South Park in late November. They are pushing Farnham all the way for top spot – and we will be in for a tough match today. A fact we know all too well having been beaten 3 -0 at their temporary home of Raynes Park Vale on the opening game of the season.

For ourselves we have seen a good response since the 4-0 reverse here to Hartley Wintney at the end of November. Horndean were the visitors 2 weeks ago, and an amazing performance all round saw us triumph 8-0 – our best league win for many years, also notable for a hat-trick from George Moore. We then travelled to Rayners Lane, and despite falling behind right on the break, a strong second half performance gave us a 2-1 win. We followed this up on Boxing Day when we travelled to Burnham to face Southall – not our happiest of hunting grounds – but another solid performance – as well as another George Moore goal gave us a 1-0 win. We now sit in 3rd place – making today's game a real top of the table clash.

Next up we the face Harrow Borough here on New Years Day, before we travel to Carshalton to face Sutton Common Rovers on Saturday 4th January. We then quickly renew acquaintances with Southall as we play them here on Tues 2nd January in the quarter final of the Middlesex Charity Cup.

Match Report

Saturday 14th December Uxbridge 8-0 Horndean

Moore Moore Moore

Christmas is traditionally a time for excess, and on Saturday Uxbridge got prepared for the upcoming festive season, by filling their boots with an eight-goal demolition of visiting Horndean. It was also the day they gave their new electronic scoreboard its debut - and certainly gave it a good thorough testing as the goals tally mounted up.

The home side were up and running early on, as in just the fifth minute a knock down from a corner fell invitingly to George Moore just inside the box, and he lashed the ball home with a first-time volley past visiting keeper Cameron Scott - something that he would get increasingly familiar with as the game wore on. The trick was nearly repeated four minutes later when another corner fell invitingly to Moore, and his sweetly struck shot was heading for the net, only for defender Kyle Bailey to head away at the last minute, with the keeper beaten. Uxbridge continued to press forward and were unlucky not to double the lead on eleven minutes, when a combination of the bar and the keepers head, kept out a lobbed shot from Moore again. Chances were coming thick and fast now, and Kai Hobbs had gone close, before Uxbridge did double their lead, it was on twenty minutes when Josh Addae made inroads on the right-hand side, and he fed Andrio Brandao on the edge of the box, the midfielder took one touch and then rifled the ball into the corner of the net for a fine finish. If Horndean thought things couldn't get any worse, they soon did just before the half hour when Zackery Willett received a straight red card for a late high tackle on Fabio Sole - leaving them with the best part of an hour to play with only 10 men. Brandao was in the thick of the action, and he curled a shot narrowly wide, just after as the visitors struggled to keep the ball. The game

was put out of reach for them just before the break though, with two quickfire goals. Firstly on 44 minutes Ada Okorogheye held up the ball in the box, and his pass found George Moore on the run, to cooly round the keeper and slot home his second, before Okorogheye himself netted in stoppage time after good work from Brandao to beat the defender and cross for an easy finish from the striker from a couple of yards out.

Uxbridge could have easily taken their foot off the pedal in the second half, but not a bit of it, just after the break Casey Bocarro headed over, and shortly after had a shot well tipped round the post by Scott. The fifth goal did arrive though just past the hour, as George Moore completed his hat-trick as some neat interplay around the box, he found enough space to fire the ball home just inside the box. With 15 league goals so far this season, Moore is proving instrumental in Uxbridge's season - and long may it continue. By now heads and well and truly dropped for the visitors, and Uxbridge were attacking at will, the sixth goal arrived as CI Fearn was impeded in the box at a corner, for a penalty that nobody seemed to notice had been given. Regardless, substitute Alex Witham stepped up to calmly slot the ball home. With ten to play, Uxbridge worked a fine seventh goal as Okorogheye broke away from a rare Horndean attack, he raced into the box, before laying the ball off to Leo Decabo who expertly placed the ball into the top corner, there was time for Okorogheye to notch his second - and Uxbridge's eighth - when on 85 minutes the striker again broke into the box, turned his defender and fired another excellent finish into the top corner. There was time for Scott to deny Decabo another goal, when he did well to smother a low shot. George Legg in the Uxbridge goal had been a virtual spectator for most of the match but was called on late on - when he did well to block a shot from a rare Horndean break - picking up a knock in the process - but all was well and Uxbridge saw the game out. All in all, an amazing afternoon's work, and a complete contrast to the defeat by Hartley Wintney two weeks ago, all the team and management should take great credit from the performance, and The Reds go into that festive period in good spirits.

CHRISTMAS time is for giving as they say, well the fixtures computer has certainly served up a festive treat for Non-League fans everywhere this yuletide. Traditionally, the Boxing Day fixtures are one of the first fans look out for when the schedule is announced – and this year hasn't disappointed with a number of crunch derby clashes taking place up and down the country.

Whatever the level, you just can't beat a derby-day cracker to complete your Christmas, so here are just a few that have caught the eye of our NLP groundhoppers. The National League always seems to serve up a Boxing Day feast with all the trimmings – and the Aldershot Town v Woking derby is usually at the forefront. Just 12 miles separate these rival clubs, just across the Surrey/Hampshire border, ensuring there's never any shortage of drama for the big crowds on show. There's a Tyne-Tees affair when Gateshead and Hartlepool United meet at the International Stadium, while Dagenham v Braintree and Southend United v Ebbsfleet United ensure that Essex and Kent are well represented on the day,

At Step 2, Brackley Town and Leamington looks tasty in National League North, similarly the Derbyshire dual between Buxton and Alfreton Town and an 'Old Farm' East Anglian derby with King's Lynn Town hosting Needham Market. A big day in the north-east is further demonstrated by Darlington v Scarborough Athletic and Spennymoor Town v South Shields, not to mention Stockton Town v Hebburn Town in the Northern Premier League, Premier Division at Step 3. The South is equally as intriguing, An all-Hertfordshire clash between Hemel Hempstead Town and St Albans City is a worthy headline act, while Aveley versus Hornchurch and Tonbridge Angels v Maidstone United are big games in Essex and Kent respectively. Chippenham Town v Bath City is often a tasty affair also. The NPL also serves us up with Matlock Town v Ilkeston Town and Bamber Bridge v Lancaster City, while at Step 4 there are two more all-north east affairs between Bishop Auckland and Consett and Dunston v Newton Aycliffe. AFC Rushden & Diamonds v Corby Town is always an eagerly-awaited affair in their respective parts of Northamptonshire, while in an ultracongested Midlands division, packed with local affairs, unbeaten Quorn and Shepshed Dynamo, separated by just seven miles, battle it out in Leicestershire.

All eyes in Manchester will be on Wythenshawe when bitter rivals FC and Town meet at Hollyhedge Park, while Hednesford Town v Stafford Rangers looks a Boxing Day battle of heavyweights to rival Usyk and Fury. The Southern League Premier Central is always full of crunch local affairs and Boxing Day doesn't disappoint with AFC Telford United and Halesowen Town or Bromsgrove Sporting v Stourbridge arguably the pick.

The Somerset clash between Tiverton Town and Taunton Town always whets the appetite in the west country, while Havant & Waterlooville and Gosport Borough love a battle on the south coast. And if you're in or around the Beaconsfield area of Buckinghamshire then why not make the trip to Holloways Park where they take on close rivals Flackwell Heath in a lunchtime showdown. In the Isthmian League, the all-Essex affair between Billericay Town and Canvey Island gets the juices flowing, as does the Sussex derby between Horsham v Bognor Regis Town and the north London clash between Hendon and Potters Bar Town. Margate versus Ramsgate is undoubtedly the game of the day in Step 4 as the two Kent coast promotion rivals lock horns, while Hartley Wintney v Farnham Town, a local battle of third versus first, is also well worth a visit.

At Step 5 and 6, of course, derbies are a little more commonplace but there are a few, mainly, cross-town affairs that are sure to whet the appetite of the locals. 1874 Northwich v Northwich Victoria ticks all the boxes for a Boxing Day bonanza, as does Newcastle Benfield v Newcastle Bue Star in Ebac Northern League Division One. And division two produces two more in the form of Chester-Le-Street Town versus Chester-Le-Street United and Sunderland West End v Sunderland RCA. The lunchtime affair in the United Counties League Premier North between Newark & Sherwood and Newark Town bares all the hallmarks of a cracker, similarly Northampton ON Chenecks v Northampton Sileby Rangers in Premier South and the Division One fixture between Retford United and Retford. And, if you're on your holidays on the Isle of Wight and missing your football fix, then how about East Cowes Victoria v Newport (IoW) in the Wessex League.

Wherever you are in the country, you're never far from a crunch local derby to savour. Combining the spirit of Non-League with the spirit of Christmas, it's truly one of the highlights of the football calendar. But wherever you go and whatever you do, The NLP wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Former QPR youngster who has played for Finn Harps in the League of Ireland, and Portadown in Northern Ireland. Joined The Reds in October 2024 from Hanwell Town. Previous clubs include Harrow Borough, Dagenham & Redbridge, Enfield Town and Maidstone United.

Played at Chalfont St Peter for Manager Danny Edwards. Vastly experienced player whose versatility makes him a managers dream. Former North Greenford United, Waltham Abbey, Aylesbury, Hanwell Town and Chertsey Town player.

Fabio Sole (Midfield/Forward)

Young attacking midfielder signed from Hendon in November 2024. Played for Hanwell Town in season 2023-24. Started his career with Reading U-18s, moving on to Oxford United U-18s from whom he went on loan to Farnborough. On leaving Oxford United he took a career break, then joined Slough Town and Met. Police before joining Hanwell in July 2023, and then onto Hendon in July 2024

Ada Okorogheye (Forward)

Came through the Academy at Slough Town before moving to the United States to study and play "soccer". Played last season at step 3 with Beaconsfield Town. Scored a hat-trick on his Uxbridge debut at Cobham in the FA Cup.

.Uxbridge FC Club History

In the late 19th century, the game of "football" was growing in popularity and on the 3rd of February 1871 a group of eminent local businessmen held the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Football Club. Alocal solicitor, Mr. William Gardiner, was elected as the Club's President and the club's colours were chosen as white shirts with a light blue Maltese cross and a light blue velvet cap with silver tassel.

Friendly games against local opposition were played in the early years, until the FA Cup was entered in 1873. A First Round Victory over Gitanos set up a Second-Round tie against eventual finalists Royal Engineers, which the Engineers narrowly won 2-1. It was at this time that Uxbridge could boast amongst its ranks a Full England International. Hubert Heron played for England on two occasions whilst an Uxbridge player before he moved to Wanderers FC where he gained further international honours. His brother Francis, formerly of Uxbridge, also played for England after joining him at Wanderers FC. The club changed its colours to Oxford Blue and Cambridge Blue shirts in 1874, but they were in financial difficulties and folded later that year.

The main problem for Uxbridge was the lack of a permanent home ground (a problem that was to plague them until the middle of the next century), the committee searched the town for a suitable base but were thwarted at every turn and they led a nomadic existence, moving ground every few years. The enthusiasm for a team in Uxbridge was still prevalent and the Club was reformed in 1879. In 1886 Uxbridge FC amalgamated with another local club, Uxbridge Crescents, and played under thisname in season 1886/87, before reverting to plain old Uxbridge the following season. It was at this time that the Red Shirts, which are still worn today, were adopted and the nickname "The Reds" wasborn. Their first trophy was won in 1889 when they lifted the West Middlesex Cup, defeating Colnbrook 1-0 in the Final.

The end of the 19th century was a particularly successful period for The Reds as they won the West Middlesex Cup on three further occasions and also won the prestigious Middlesex Senior Cup twice. In 1894 they beat the 3rd Grenadier Guards 2-0 and repeated that success two years later with a 3-2 victory over local rivals Southall in a replay in front of over 5000 spectators. The outstanding achievement however was in reaching the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup in 1898. This was the club's first season in the competition, and they had to win eight ties before meeting Middlesborough in the final at Crystal Palace. Unfortunately, their Northeast rivals proved too strong for them on the day and ran out 2-0 winners.

During this successful period for the club, they became founder members of Division Two of the Southern League in 1894, finishing fourth in their first four seasons. However, in season 1898/99 they finished next to bottom and the dwindling crowds (averaging around 500) meant that financially the club was once again in trouble. A decision was therefore taken to withdraw from the Southern League and join the local Middlesex League to try and stabilise the club. However, a majority of the more talented players joined other clubs, and they struggled in their new surroundings, finishing bottom with only one point from their 14 games. At the end of the season the club had a deficit of £130 and with few players the club once again folded.

For two years much fund raising amongst the local community finally saw the club's debts paid and the reformed Uxbridge FC joined the West Middlesex League for the 1902/03 season. In 1904 the Great Western Suburban League was entered and here they stayed until the outbreak of the First World War. Their best finish during this period was as Runners-up to Brentford Reserves in 1910/11. They also won the Middlesex Charity Cup on two occasions in 1908 and 1913, as they looked to reestablish themselves as a force in the football world. Following the end of hostilities Uxbridge joined the Athenian League and added "Town" to their name. An unsuccessful first Athenian League campaign saw them relegated back to the Great Western Suburban League in 1920.

A successful four seasons saw them back in the Athenian League in 1924 where they remained until 1937. The Middlesex Charity Cup was won for the third time in 1935 as Finchley were beaten 4-3.

Two poor seasons saw them finish bottom of the Athenian League in 1936 and 1937 and the club failed to be re-elected. They joined the Spartan League for the 1937/38 season, dropping "Town" from their name at the end of the campaign stood proudly at the summit. Championship celebrations, however, were cut short when it was discovered that The Reds had played an ineligible player and were deduced six points, placing them in third position behind Champions Marlow.

Following the debacle of their one and only season in the Spartan League they resigned and joined the London League prior to the Second World War. During the war years they continued to play and joined the newly formed Great Western Combination League before re-joining the London League in 1945, finishing as Runners-up to Edgware Town.

Uxbridge were founder members of the Corinthian League in 1946 and remained in this league for the next seventeen years. Finally, in 1948, after over three quarters of a century of searching, a ground of their own was purchased. A piece of land in Cleveland Road, Cowley was bought for £5,800 by then President Mr. W.S. Try. The ground was named after a large house that stood on the land and "Honeycroft" was the new home of Uxbridge Football Club. During this period, they won their only Championship to-date when they were crowned Corinthian League Champions at the end of the 1959/60 season. They also won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the third time in 1951 when they defeated Hayes 2-1.

This was a successful period in the club's history as they finished in the top five of the Corinthian League on no less than eight occasions and crowds were averaging around the thousand mark. A reorganisation of non-League football saw the end of the Corinthian League in 1963, and the club found itself once again in Division One of the Athenian League. This was a lean time for The Reds, they were relegated to Division Two in 1967 and financial problems once again beset them. They gained national publicity in 1976 when England were looking for a side to play as part of their warmup for the forthcoming World Cup campaign. Uxbridge took on a full-strength England at Wembley, losing 8-0. The ground problems that had blighted Uxbridge throughout their history surfaced once again and the club had to find a new home. In 1978 they moved to their current headquarters in Horton Road, Yiewsley. A former works Sports & Social Club they have developed the site to the superb standard you see today.

Over the past 43 years they have added floodlights (opened by the visit of Arsenal in 1981), new stands, fencing and in more recent times a new clubhouse was opened and car park laid. On the playing front the club won the Middlesex Charity Cup for the fourth time in 1982, their first silverware for 31 years, and moved to the Isthmian League in the same year, winning promotion to Division One in 1985. The Final of the AC Delco Cup (League Cup) was reached in 1986, where they met Premier Division Champions Sutton United. The Reds failed to stop Sutton completing "The Double" though, losing 3-1 in the Final in front of over a thousand spectators at Imber Court, the home of Metropolitan Police FC, Uxbridge entered the London Challenge Cup for the first time in the 1992/93 season and hence followed a love affair between the Reds and the magnificent trophy. In the eight seasons they entered the competition they reached five finals, winning on three occasions in 1994,1997 and 2000.

They won the Middlesex Senior Cup for the fourth time in 2001, defeating Harrow Borough 3-0 in the Final held at Honeycroft. In 2004 the club were moved across the pyramid to the Southern League and have reached the Play-Offs on three occasions. In 2004/05 they lost on penalties, after leading Maldon Town in extra-time, in 2007/08 they narrowly lost 0-1 at Oxford City and in 2011/12 they lost 2-1 at Bedworth United in the Semi-Finals. In 2018 Uxbridge were moved back across the pyramid, re-joining the Isthmian League in the South-Central Division.

In 2019 Uxbridge appointed only their sixth manager in over fifty years. Ron Clack was in charge for 18 years from 1970, followed by Peter Marshall for one season, Michael Harvey for three, before George Talbot took the reins for fourteen seasons in 1992. In 2006 Tony Choules became the man in charge, being replaced by our current manager Danny Edwards in 2019. Danny is a UEFA A licensed coach who spent 15 years as manager of Chalfont St Peter AFC. He steered Chalfont St Peter to Step 4 of the league system in 2011, as well as reaching the 3rd Qualifying Round of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions. Danny has with him a confident team which includes Fred Cummings as his Assistant Manager. Fred is well known to the followers of the Red Army as a combative centre half with 320 First Team appearances for Uxbridge in the 1980's. The Middlesex Chairty Cup was won for the 8th time in 2022, with a 2-0 victory over Hanwell Town. This feat was repeated last season when North Greenford United were defeated 2-1 in the final at Bedfont Sports.

In recent times the club has mourned the passing of several club stalwarts. President Alan Odell, who had been associated with The Reds for eighty years, in 2016. Chairman Alan Holloway in 2021 and the club's long-standing Treasurer, David Tucker, passed away in 2022. "Mr. Uxbridge" had been associated with the club for over 50 years and was a massive influence in the running of Uxbridge Football Club.

From his legacy the club have been able to undertake the installation of a state-of-the-art 3G pitch, upgraded LED floodlights, a new 158-seat stand, dug-outs and both pitch-surround and perimeter fencing. More improvements are planned!

Kingstonian Football Club History

The Kingstonian club came into being in 1919 as a result of the merger between Kingston Town FC and Old Kingstonians FC. However, the club can trace its origins even further back and celebrated its centenary in 1985; the reason for this is that one of its forerunners, Kingston & Surbiton YMCA FC played its first match on a ground in Bushy Park in November1885. In 1887 the YMCA changed its name to Saxons FC. Then in 1890 it changed to Kingston Wanderers FC and once again to Kingston-on-Thames Association Football Club (KAFC) in 1893. Unfortunately, in the early 1900s there was trouble in the camp and in 1908 the club split in two with Kingston Town playing at Norbiton Sports Ground and Old Kingstonians on what became known as the "back pitch" at Richmond Road.

The new Kingstonian set-up started life in the Athenian League, a competition that it won in both seasons 1923/24 and 1925/26, playing its home matches at a brand-new ground in Richmond Road that remained its home until 1988. In 1929 the Kingstonians, widely known as the Ks accepted an invitation to join the Isthmian League as a replacement for the Civil Service FC and remained in that league until 1998.

The Ks have a credible history and their blue-ribbon period of the early 1930's produced players such as Frank Macey, Doug Whitehead, George Lee and the Whittaker brothers achieving in April 1933 its then greatest accolade by winning the FA Amateur Cup which well and truly put Kingstonian on the football map. Wins over Portland United (after a replay), Leyton, South Bank, Dulwich Hamlet, and Whitehall Printeries took the Ks through to the final, staged at Dulwich, against Stockton, which resulted in a 1-1 draw. For the replay Kingstonian had to travel to Darlington, but despite going one goal behind after only four minutes, the Ks came back to win 4-1 thanks to goals from Gibson, Urpeth (penalty) and Whitehead (2).

In the following season, 1933/34, Ks bowed out of the Amateur Cup in a second-round replay to Wimbledon at Plough Lane, but went on to successfully win the Isthmian League, a feat they repeated in season 1936/37 and, of course in 1997/98. In season 1959/60 it seemed as though the Amateur Cup was going to return to Kingston as the legendary Johnny Whing headed Ks into the lead against Hendon in the final at Wembley Stadium. Two goals in the last three minutes, though, had the FA officials busily changing the red and white ribbons for green and white ones as Hendon won the cup for the first time. To qualify for the final, Kingstonian disposed of Histon, Letchworth Town, Ferryhill Athletic, Carshalton Athletic, and Crook Town in a semi-final tie played at St James Park, the home of Newcastle United.

The Kingstonian teams of the early 1960's were arguably as good as those of the 1930's and many trophies were won. After winning the Surrey Senior cup for the 9th time (as Kingstonian) in 1967, the clubs successes dried up and despite the endeavours of many managers and countless players, the team went into decline. In 1979 relegation to Division

One was suffered, but in 1985 the club bounced back as runners up to Farnborough Town. Ks were a mite fortunate as Leatherhead, who finished above them on goal difference, had three points deducted for fielding an ineligible player. Kingstonian remained as members of the Premier Division until the end of the 1997/98 season when promoted to the Nationwide Conference.

The famous Richmond Road ground, which was loved by so many, became increasingly dilapidated and subject to vandalism, so a decision was made to relocate and develop the site for housing - a move that also assisted the clubs finances. The last game played there was in January 1988 against Bromley. After one and a half seasons ground sharing at Hamptons Beveree ground. Ks opened their brand new Kingsmeadow Stadium (on the site of the old Norbiton Sports Ground) in August 1989, when Slough Town were the visitors.

After achieving a draw with Peterborough United in 1992, the club recorded a fine FA Cup win at Kingsmeadow by beating Brighton in 1994; they also competed well the following year against Plymouth. In front of 3,495 supporters the Ks held Leyton Orient to a 0-0 draw only to lose 2-1 in the FA Cup 2nd Round Replay in 1998. Drawn away to Luton Town in the First Round of the FA Cup in October 1999 saw the Ks come in at half time 1-1 only to go down 4-2 at the end.

At the beginning of the 1997-98 season, the club appointed Geoff Chapple as manager. He brought about an exciting change of fortune for the club. In his first season, he took the club to the Isthmian League Premier Division Championship. In the following season, their first in the Football Conference, the club finished a creditable 8th, but they capped it all off by winning the FA Trophy at Wembley in May 1999 with a 1-0 victory over Forest Green Rovers.

The following season 1999/2000, in the last FA Trophy Final between the famous Twin Towers, the Ks retained their title with an exciting 3-2 win over Kettering Town, giving Chapple his 5th FA Trophy Final win in seven seasons (the other three with Woking). The club also reached their highest position of 5th in the Conference. However, season 2000/2001 proved to be extremely mixed. The Ks made the headlines again, with a tremendous run in the FA Cup. A home win against Devizes Town was the start of an incredible run that saw the Ks defeat Brentford, Southport and Southend United all away from home. In the Fourth Round, Ks were thwarted in the last kick of the game at Ashton Gate as Bristol City scored a very last gasp equaliser before winning the replay at Kingsmeadow in a live televised match. Unfortunately, the clubs league form proved to be exactly the opposite, as the Ks finished next to bottom and were relegated back to the Ryman Football League.

Season 2001/2002 and it was time again for a change, as the club and Geoff Chapple parted by mutual consent. Kingstonian quickly appointed former Dover Athletic man Bill Williams as their new manager, who had working alongside him former Tottenham Hotspur player Steve Sedgley as his assistant. In late 2001 Williams departed the club and Sedgley moved up to the position of manager and his assistant was Kim Harris who was promoted up from the position of reserve team manager.

December 2002 saw the sudden resignation of the highly promising Sedgley as manager. The club immediately promoted Harris, a former K's striker, to manager and appointed former Woking man Scott Steele as player/coach. The club had ups and downs over this period but only failed to make the new Conference South following a single goal defeat to Lewes in a Ryman League playoff.

Following a poor start to season 2004/05 Harris decided to call it a day after just four games. Scott Steele was promoted to manager but, despite encouraging good football from his side, was unable to prevent what became an inevitable relegation to Division One. However, good news arrived off the field when local businessman Jimmy Cochrane bought the football club, giving the club a positive outlook for the first time in several years. Steeles resignation followed towards the end of the season when former assistant manager Ian McDonald was brought in along with Stuart McIntyre as his coach with a view to resurrecting the clubs fortunes.

The 2005/06 season saw Ks move up the table only to miss out on playoffs on the final day of the season, though silverware was achieved following a 1-0 win over AFC Wimbledon in the Surrey Senior Cup Final. McDonald was almost immediately succeeded by McIntyre as manager, whilst the club was jointly bought by Mark Anderson and Malcolm Winwright – the board would be completed by the presence of John Fenwick as chairman from May 2011 to June 2014 and then co-chairman with Anderson and Winwright until January 2018, when he became sole chairman again.

Stuart McIntyre's time as manager was unfortunately short-lived and unsuccessful, and midway through the 2006/07 season he was replaced as manager by former Walton and Hersham manager Alan Dowson. Dowson and his team immediately transformed the club and achieved a semblance of stability. There was plenty of expectation for the 2007/08 season, though inconsistency led to the K's missing the play-offs once again on the final day of the season.

The 2008/09 season was successful from start to finish. A run to the Third Qualifying Round of the FA Cup was highlighted by a 4-0 home win over Conference South team Braintree Town, all four goals scored by midfielder Dean Lodge. This performance led to the K's player winning the Performance of the Round award from the FA. But it was in the Ryman League Division One South that the biggest success came, as a very strong start and a storming finish led to Kingstonian winning the division by seven points ahead of Cray Wanderers.

After an absence of four years, the club almost passed straight up through the Ryman Premier Division, recovering from a difficult start to reach the end of the season playoffs. It was Boreham Wood, however, who won the controversial final match. Heartache followed in the following 2010/11 season when a final day collapse at Margate cost another attempt at the playoffs. The following two seasons saw mid-table finishes in the league accompanied by successive London Senior Cup final appearances, before a return to the playoffs in the 2013/14 season, after the club finished runners-up in the league. A semi-final defeat against AFC Hornchurch however denied the chance of promotion, in what turned out to be Alan Dowson's last game in charge.

With former K's midfielder Tommy Williams installed as manager, the club again reached the FA Cup Third Qualifying Round, losing 3-2 to a last-minute goal against Eastbourne Borough. The league campaign was a roller-coaster, a late challenge for the play-offs falling short in the last couple of weeks of the season. In his second season, the 2015-16 campaign saw the K's lift their first cup in ten years, winning the Isthmian League Cup with a 5-0 victory over Faversham Town.

The 2016-17 season proved to be a difficult campaign, as the club flirted dangerously with relegation thanks to a dreadful run following Christmas; with six games left and hopes almost lost, Tommy Williams was replaced as manager by former Billericay Town man Craig Edwards. He turned the club around immediately and K's moved up to 16th after a five-match unbeaten run to end the season. K's left the Kingsmeadow Stadium at the end of the season and moved to Fetcham Grove with Leatherhead FC; Edwards resigned in October 2017 and was replaced by former Whyteleafe manager Leigh Dynan.

At the beginning of the 2018-19 season, Kingstonian moved back to the Royal Borough of Kingston-upon-Thames and started a ground share with Corinthian-Casuals at King Georges Field. A difficult season saw Ks have three managers, as Leigh Dynan was replaced by Dean Brennan and then very quickly by stand-in manager Kim Harris - Ks moved from second place in the table on New Year's Day to escaping relegation by a single place after a horror run of results.

The 2019-20 season may have been curtailed by the COVID-19 pandemic, but new manager Hayden Birds arrival gave the club an enormous boost, and the Ks supporters were rewarded amply with fine runs in both the FA Cup and the FA Trophy - the club reached the First Round of the FA Cup for the first time since 2000-01, and defeated Macclesfield Town 4-0 at Moss Rose in Round One before bowing out in Round Two at home to AFC Fylde on a day that saw the club host that afternoons edition of BBC Football Focus. Their FA Trophy run also ended in Round Two but was most notable for a fine 3-1 victory over Alan Dowson's Woking team at King Georges Field. The 2020-21 season was curtailed even more than the previous season, ending in November with K's sitting in fourth position in the Premier Division.

The 2021-22 season started out extremely well, with K's topping the Premier Division for a lengthy period before Christmas, but form then disappeared, and the club had to settle for an ultimately disappointing tenth place and a place in the Surrey Senior Cup Final, which was lost on penalties to Dorking Wanderers after a 1-1 draw. During the summer, the club moved temporary home once again, this time to Imperial Fields at Tooting and Mitcham United, and Lee O'Leary was appointed manager after the resignation of Hayden Bird. A difficult season ensued, Lee O'Leary stepped down due to personal reasons, to be replaced by Spencer

Knight, who also resigned for personal reasons a couple of months later and was replaced by former Westfield manager Simon Lane, who saved the club from relegation. However, the 2023-24 was even more difficult for the club, as it started poorly and got worse. Simon Lane left in February 2024 to be replaced by his assistant Tutu Henriques, relegation became inevitable, and the club finished bottom of the league.

In preparation for Kingstonian's first season in the South-Central Division of the Isthmian League, former Walton and Hersham chief Scott Harris was appointed as manager, and an almost totally new squad looked forward to the 2024-25 season as the club moved to another new home ground, this time sharing with Raynes Park Vale FC.

LIAM ALLEN (Goalkeeper): DoB 30th September 1994 - Liam was part of Walton and Hersham's remarkable rise up the Pyramid as the Swans went quickly from the Combined Counties League to just missing the Southern League Premier South play-offs. He started out in Chelsea's youth system before moving to Woking and then on to Badshot Lea and Molesey before winning promotion with Walton and Hersham in both 2020-21 and 2021-22. Joined Kingstonian in June 2024.

MARK AMANING (Defender): DoB 4th September 1998 - Signed for Kingstonian in August 2024, Mark is a Queen's Park Rangers Academy and Tottenham Hotspur U18s product who spent some time abroad between 2019 and 2022 with RVHH Ridderkerk in the Netherlands and SV Werder Bremen III in Germany. He moved back to England at the start of the 2023-24 season, joining Hartley Wintney and then in December 2023 moved to Imber Court to play for Metropolitan Police.

PACEY BEAN (Midfielder): DoB 3rd February 2006 - A member of Kingstonian's successful Under 18s team in the last two seasons, scoring 22 goals in 43 appearances. Played some first team football with East Grinstead Town last season, making three appearances but signed first team forms for the K's in August 2024. Has been playing recently for Loxwood on a dual registration basis.

JOE BELL (Defender): DoB 6th April 1998 - Joined Kingstonian in October 2024 after a short spell with Raynes Park Vale. Has previous experience with Clyde's Under 20s in Scotland, Wilmington University in Delaware and Skelleftea FF in Sweden. Joined South Park in April 2021 before a move to Carshalton Athletic in 2023 and the short move to RPV in the summer of 2024.

OSCAR BILLINGTON (Midfielder): DoB 9th July 1998 - Signed for Kingstonian in July 2024 after his move down south from his native Liverpool. In the 2023-24 season he scored eleven goals in all competitions as part of a South Liverpool squad that eventually won promotion to the North West Counties League First Division. Playing for Cobham on a dual registration basis.

FLYNN BOLTON (Midfielder): DoB 8th November 2004 - Flynn signed for Kingstonian on a dual registration basis from Basingstoke Town in October 2024. A product of AFC Wimbledon's academy and then Aldershot Town's youth system, Flynn has also had spells with Walton & Hersham and Binfield.

EWAN CARLIN (Goalkeeper): DoB 10th April 2008 - Young goalkeeper who impressed last season with the successful Under 18s team and signed first team forms in July 2024.

TYLER COX (Midfielder): DoB 24th August 2000 - Joined Kingstonian in October 2024 from Aveley. Tyler was with Herne Bay when the club won promotion to the Isthmian Premier in the 2021-22 season, and in the 2022-23 Season he scored the winning goal that kept Sutton Common Rovers in the Isthmian South Central in a play-off against Crawley Down Gatwick. In the 2023-24 season he joined Leatherhead, helping them to the play-off final before moving to Aveley in the summer of 2024. This season he played for Whitehawk as a dual reg signing.

ALEX DUBOV (Goalkeeper): DoB 1st January 2006 - Another young goalkeeper who played in Kingstonian's Under 18s squad in the 2023-24 season. He has trials with the likes of Brighton and Hove Albion, Famalicao in Portugal and FC Pafos in Cyprus.

REUBEN DUNCAN (Midfielder): DoB 17th October 2000 - A former Millwall academy prospect who has seen action for Welling United, VCD Athletic, Walton Casuals, Banstead Athletic and, most recently, Redhill, before joining Kingstonian in July 2024.

LUCAS DYER (Defender): DoB 8th February 2007 - Started his career in AFC Wimbledon's academy before moving to Kingstonian's Under 18s squad in the 2023-24 season, earning himself the opportunity to sign first team forms in July 2024.

STAN FLAHERTY (Midfielder): DoB 5th December 2001 - Exciting winger who began his career at the age of 10 with Arsenal and progressed to their Academy before a move to Queen's Park Rangers. He had a loan spell with Hayes and Yeading in the 2022-23 season and then joined Walton and Hersham in August 2023 before joining Kingstonian in May 2024.

JAKE FRAILING (Midfielder): DoB 17th August 2001 - A Queen's Park Rangers Academy product who moved to Eastbourne Borough in August 2022 but played most of the 2022-23 season with Southall before moving to Walton and Hersham in July 2023. At the end of the campaign, Jake joined Kingstonian in May 2024.

PALACE FRANCIS (Forward): DoB 7th June 2002 - Signed for Kingstonian in May 2024 after playing the 2023-24 season with Sevenoaks Town, Raynes Park Vale and Phoenix Sports. Signed for Bromley in December 2021 and had loan spells first with Leatherhead and then with Walton and Hersham.

NIMA GHANDALI (Midfielder): DoB 13th September 2007 - A former trialist at Queen's Park Rangers, Nima made his Kingstonian U18s debut in August 2024 and made such a positive impression that he signed first team forms in November 2024 and made his first team debut that month. Versatile, Nima can play in a number of positions.

MITCHAL GOUGH (Defender): DoB 16th December 1994 - Now into his second spell with Kingstonian after a brief stay in 2017-18, Mitchal became a K's player once again in May 2024 after a highly successful time with Walton and Hersham. He also counts the likes of Leatherhead, Walton Casuals, Merstham and Staines Town as his former clubs.

JOE HICKS (Defender): DoB 7th November 1990 - Joined Kingstonian in May 2024 after a massively successful four-year spell with Walton and Hersham, gaining promotion in two consecutive seasons. He started out in Walton and Hersham's youth teams before playing for the likes of Corinthian-Casuals, Hampton & Richmond Borough and Walton Casuals. He had a short spell with the K's in the pre-season 2011-12 but returns twelve years later to become club captain for the hoops.

BOB HONEY (Goalkeeper): DoB 29th September 2006 - Joined Kingstonian's Under 18s squad at the start of the 2022-23 season, making nine appearances that season. He then joined Woking's Academy and has played three times for Spelthorne Sports whilst also playing for the Cards' U19s. Rejoined Kingstonian's U18s this season and signed first team forms in December 2024.

ALEX KELLY (Midfielder): DoB 7th December 1996 - Described as a "Swiss Army knife of a player", Alex joined Kingstonian in May 2024 from Walton and Hersham. He is a central midfielder who began his career on the books of Charlton Athletic before joining Walton Casuals in 2016, winning promotion from the Isthmian League South in 2018. After a year at Horsham, he joined Walton and Hersham in the summer of 2020 and was part of the Swan Revolution, gaining two promotions and one near-promotion in three years.

TAEHYUN KIM (Defender / Midfielder): DoB 6th December 2007 - Another of Nigel James' Under 18s players, he made his Kingstonian U18s debut in August 2024 and impressed greatly, earning himself a first team registration in November 2024. South Korean-born, Taehyun was previously with Brisbane Strikers in Queensland.

JOSH KIRKHAM (Defender): DoB 23rd August 2006 - Made his Kingstonian U18s debut in August 2022 and became a regular for the team in the following season. Josh signed first team forms in the 2023-24 season and made his debut in April 2024 against Chatham Town. Currently with Spelthorne Sports on a dual registration basis.

JACK LILLIE (Midfielder): DoB 26th April 2006 - Signed first team forms with Kingstonian in the 2023-24 season, having had an outstanding season in the centre of midfield with the Under 18s, culminating in captaining the side to the Combined Counties Youth League West and League Cup double at the end of the season. He has also had first team experience with Corinthian-Casuals and played for Woking's Academy team in the 2022-23 season, and this season joined Camberley Town and Sutton Common Rovers before returning to the K's in October 2024.

HARRY MILLS (Defender): DoB 7th July 1995 - Signed for the K's in December 2024 after leaving Walton and Hersham at the end of the 2023-24 season. He is currently also with Tooting and Mitcham United on a dual registration basis whilst he regains match fitness after injury kept him out of the game. Began his career with Hampton and Richmond Borough before joining Walton and Hersham in October 2014 and then a brief spell with Guildford City in 2016. From there he moved to Walton Casuals, winning promotion with them, and then Horsham in 2019. In 2020, he re-joined Walton and Hersham and was part of the Swans' rise up the Pyramid.

JACOB MUNTING (Midfielder): DoB 7th November 2001 - A former Millwall Academy product, Jacob joined Kingstonian in July 2024 from Walton and Hersham. He has also spent some time with Walton Casuals, Cray Wanderers and Beaconsfield Town.

BEN PARKINSON (Defender / Midfielder): DoB 22nd January 2007 - Made his debut with Kingstonian's successful Under 18s squad at the start of the 2023-24 season, and impressed enough to sign first team forms, playing his first game for the club in March 2024.

JOE PRATLEY-JONES (Defender): DoB 27th December 1991 - Joined Kingstonian in May 2024 after a hugely successful time with Walton and Hersham, having signed for them in 2020 and being an integral part in the Swans' rise up the Pyramid. He has also played for Egham Town and Molesey in the past.

TAUREAN ROBERTS (Midfielder): DoB 23rd February 1991 - Re-joined Kingstonian in August 2024 having played in two games for the club in 2018. Taurean started his career with the academy ranks at Crystal Palace and has gone to play for the likes of Tooting and Mitcham United, Merstham, Hampton and Richmond Borough, Metropolitan Police, Walton Casuals, Harrow Borough, Sheppey United, Walton & Hersham and AFC Whyteleafe and has won multiple promotions with multiple teams.

JONATHAN SANCHEZ (Defender): DoB 9th May 2000 - Joined Kingstonian on a dual registration basis from Cobham in October 2024. Jonathan has also played this season for Uxbridge and has previous experience with Westfield and Badshot Lea.

EDDIE SIMON (Forward): DoB 21st July 1996 - Joined Kingstonian in May 2024 after an outstanding spell with Walton and Hersham, a stint that in 2023 saw him become the first player in the history of England's top eight levels to score hat-tricks in four consecutive matches. After Scott Harris signed him for the Swans from British Airways FC, Eddie went on to score 73 goals in 119 appearances, gaining two promotions during that time.

ARSEN UJKAJ (Defender): DoB 4th October 1997 - Signed for Kingstonian in May 2024 after one season with Walton and Hersham. Previously Arsen has turned out for the likes of Farnham Town, East Grinstead Town, Metropolitan Police and Westfield.

BRADLEY WILSON (Forward): DoB 7th December 1995 - Moved to Kingstonian in May 2024 from Basingstoke Town. He joined the 'Stoke from Fleet Town in November 2019 and went on to score 99 goals, 30 of them in the 2022-23 season when they won the Isthmian South Central, primarily from the left-wing position. He started out in the youth systems at Watford and Reading, has played briefly for Metropolitan Police and spent one Australian summer in Victoria playing for Goulburn Valley Suns FC.
